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
MONTHLY UPDATE FOR APRIL 2023

Reported incidents of explosive weapon use that resulted in casualties

At least one death or injury from the use of explosive weapons was recorded in 24 countries and territories in April 2023. Worldwide, there were at least 447 reported incidents of explosive weapon use resulting in 2,632 casualties, of which 1,684 (64%) were civilians. About 35% of all reported civilian casualties occurred in Ukraine. Some of the other most affected countries and territories in terms of civilian casualties from the use of explosive weapons were Myanmar, Somalia, Sudan, and Syria. When explosive weapons were used in populated areas in April 2023, civilians reportedly accounted for 79%


of the total recorded casualties. This pattern of harm has been consistently recorded over the last decade. This data is collected from English-language media reports. It does not attempt to exhaustively capture all

incidents of explosive weapon use around the world but to serve as an indicator of the scale and pattern of deaths and injuries.

reported in five countries in April 2023. Nearly half of all incidents affected education and healthcare in Ukraine as a result of Russian airstrikes, shelling, and missiles. In seven incidents recorded in Sudan,

health facilities were damaged and health workers killed by shelling by Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) forces. In Myanmar, Myanmar military airstrikes hit hospitals, schools and IDP camps in Kachin and Kayin. Additionally, missiles fired by Israeli armed forces struck a children's hospital and surrounding housing in Gaza in the Occupied Palestinian Territories, and an armed drone dropped explosives on a medical unit in Yemen. This data may include some incidents where a device did not detonate or where there were no civilian casualties, and includes incidents where historical items such as unexploded ordnance were found and which affected the provision of these services.


